Dr. Rahul Singal is the President and Chief Executive Officer of WorldDoc, Inc. In this capacity, Dr. Singal is responsible for the development and execution of the company's overall strategy. Prior to joining WorldDoc, Dr. Singal was Vice President and Medical Director of Southwest Medical Associates, a 100+ physician multi-specialty medical group. Southwest Medical Associates is a subsidiary of Sierra Health Services, a publicly traded Managed Care Organization. Dr. Singal was responsible for physician productivity, quality of medical care, and efficiency of care delivery in the outpatient setting. In addition, he was responsible for hospital and pharmaceutical utilization and disease management. During his three years at Southwest Medical Associates, physician productivity increased by 25%, patient satisfaction increased by 15%, and staff efficiency increased by 15%. Dr. Singal was also responsible for implementation and management Southwest Medical Associates electronic medical record and served on the IDX Clinical Advisory Board.

Dr. Singal completed his residency training at the Washington University School of Medicine in St. Louis in Internal Medicine.
